GSSI will meet at the celebrated Stinson Memorial Library at 416 S. Main, Anna, Illinois. Darrel Dexter, distinguished historian and author, will present a program on the Genealogy and Biography of Robert Stinson, for whom the Library was named, at 1:30. Stinson's family history and life are a fascinating story and GSSI is pleased to offer members, and the public, this opportunity to experience one of the architectural jewels of Southern Illinois.

The distinctive library's entrance leads to a vestibule with three flights of stairs, one heading to the upper-level library and two to the lower-level auditorium. The library was designed as a single open room with bookshelves delineating the different areas within the space. The room is accentuated by decorative light fixtures and stained glass patterns. The auditorium, which features a small stage, is lit by five windows on the rear side of the building. The lower level auditorium, where GSSI will meet, is easily accessible from the rear parking lot by a side door which entails only three steps.

Stonefort Railroad Depot Museum

If you want to take a step back in time, but not get too far from home, take a nice, scenic drive to Stonefort, Illinois. Linda Blackman, Owner has shined up the old depot building and turned it into a museum for railroad history, hardware store, community history and genealogy

Stonefort is located on Route 45, only 14 miles from Harrisburg. If you are coming from the Marion area, take Route 166 south 3 miles east of Marion. Travel through Creal Springs and New Burnside. Take Route 45 North to Stonefort.

Railroad History: This Depot was part of the Cairo & Vincennes Railroad (1872). Later on it was part of the Chicago, Cleveland, Cincinnati and St. Louis line (CCC&St.L) or “the Big 4”. She has an authentic office area where the chief telegrapher/operator worked. Her collections of railroad documents, photographs, railroad equipment and railroad references are numerous and well worth viewing. She even has the original Patent for a car coupling device dated 1879. There are Illinois Central Railroad materials also.

Hardware Store: Her father owned the Hardware store and the building contains typical items found in a hardware store during that era.


Community History & Genealogy: Linda Blackman had made it her mission to collect and maintain local history and genealogy on local families that resided in the Stonefort area.

Book Review

My Brother, the IC Railroad and Southern Illinois, 1936-1942.

If you ever took a train, are interested in railroads, had a relative that worked for the Illinois Central Railroad or lived in Carbondale, this is a book you should read.

The photographer, Donald H. Miller, the author's brother, had a fascination with trains. As children, when the brothers heard the train whistle in Carbondale they would race down to the station to see the train come into town.

This book is a photo album dedicated to Donald H. Miller who died in World War II. His photos document the time period 1936 to 1942. He has unique photos of steam engines including "The Daylight Special" Engine #2012.

The ICRR Green Diamond Engine debuted in 1936. He has also captured great pictures of the City of New Orleans, Panama Limited and City of Miami. Did you know that "The Creole" was the name of the train before it was called the "City of New Orleans?"

Besides photos of the Carbondale train station, there are great pictures of the Roundhouse, north of Carbondale. Station depots at Reevesville and Rosiclare are also featured. He also photographed the Paducah car shops, freight operations and Railway Post Offices. There is even a chapter on the CE & I line.

IRISH PARISH REGISTERS LAUNCHED ONLINE

If your genealogy research extends to Ireland, you are in luck!

In early July, the National Library of Ireland released the entire Catholic Parish Register online. Almost 400,000 microfilm images make up the new online genealogy resource.

These records contain baptismal and marriage records, for the 1,091 parishes in Ireland. Information included in these records, are dates and people involved, such as godparents and witnesses. The digital register images are searchable by parish location only.
